

s a young boy, sitting in the front seat of my father's taxi, I could hear the chatter of the radio communications between other taxi drivers and the dispatch center. I can recall the darkness broken only by the lights on the dash, and the repetition of streetlights as we passed by houses and businesses, buttoned up for the night. At times, the taxi was a cocoon with just the two of us, wrapped in the smell of old leather and oil. We would talk about anything and nothing and would eventually rest in comfortable silence. The highlight of sharing this time with my father was hearing the parrot, owned by May, the dispatcher, talking into the mic, repeating things we would say back and forth. My Dad and I would roar with laughter. I loved those times.

My Dad was one of 12 children raised during the Depression. There was never enough money to make ends meet. Because of this experience, Dad worked two and sometimes three jobs to provide for our growing family. From the ages of 10 through 17, my father's main employment was as a custodian for our local school. To spend time with my dad, I would assist him working by his side, repairing plumbing, fixing electrical, painting, cleaning, and doing general repairs. This was a critical learning experience in my life with Dad as my mentor. I learned skills of various trades and what sacrifices must be made to provide for others. That has served me well to this very day. I am thankful for the time and effort he poured into me, preparing me to be a capable and confident man.

Recently, I had the joy of spending time with my daughter and her family. I thank God for the opportunity to interact

with them and get to know their interests and concerns. Their laughter was a blessing to hear. However, I noticed our world is full of distractions that rob us of the brief time we have together. Cell phones, electronics, social media, TV, and work issues compete for our attention.

Looking back, I realized I followed in my father's footsteps. It was right to provide for my family, and if it meant working two jobs, I did. Unfortunately, I didn't realize the cost to my children and myself, until it was too late. Children spell love, T-I-M-E. Spending moments with them one on one is critical. Mostly, I was not present for them, but present for others doing my job. My priorities were upside down.

What I am sharing is a hard lesson learned. I pray that some father reading this will rethink the priority of making money over spending time with his spouse and children. Spending time with my earthly father brings back wonderful memories but they can't compare to the time I spend with my heavenly Father. I have full access to Him, any time of day. The joy I have knowing He is there, listening to my concerns, and giving me direction for my life brings me comfort that is hard to put into words. He offers me forgiveness for mistakes I have made as a father and He has graciously redeemed the time.

God is our Father and He wants to spend TIME with you because He LOVES you.
