As a blue-collar worker, he worked two and sometimes three jobs to be the provider to our family. He saw to it that he supplied the things we needed, materially. He had a very dedicated work ethic and little time to play or relax. As a young teen, I knew if I wanted to spend time with him, I needed to enter his world. In other words, work alongside him whenever possible.

As devoted as my father was to his family, my mother was devoted to him and us four children. What my dad provided for us materially, my mother would provide love and spiritual needs. She was the homemaker and arranged her schedule around our needs. I do look back with fond memories.

As a young man, I fell into the same trap of working too much to provide what I thought my family needed, mainly monetary gain. I knew I had a responsibility as a dad to provide, but I didn't balance that with what my children really needed; showing them love by spending time with them and being a godly example to follow.

As a Board member, I understand there are many who come to the Women's Refuge through our counseling office or our Christian live-in program who have suffered greatly due to a loss of relationship with their parents. Many come from

broken homes, abuse, and lack of love as young children which negatively affect them as adults.

Fathers should be the protectors of the home but sadly, this is missing in today's families. The fabric of our society today is not being solidified by men who are willing to stay the course, persevere lead and love their families with the love of Christ.
