

After more than seventy years of life, I realized that I had very little knowledge or background about the origins of this special day. The nation's first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, in the state of Washington. However, the first known Father's Day service occurred in Fairmont, West Virginia on July 5, 1908, after hundreds of men died in the worst mining accident in U.S. history. Grace Golden Clayton, the daughter of a dedicated minister, proposed a service to honor all fathers, especially those who had died.

Meanwhile, across the entire country, another woman was inspired to honor fathers. In 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, was inspired by Anna Jarvis and the idea of Mother's Day. Her father, William Jackson Smart, a farmer and Civil War veteran, was also a single parent who raised Sonora and her five brothers by himself after his wife Ellen died giving birth to their youngest child in 1898. While attending a Mother's Day church service in 1909, Sonora, then 27 years old, came up with the idea. Within a few months, Sonora had convinced the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA to set aside a Sunday in June to celebrate fathers. Thus, on June 19th, 1910, the first Father's Day events commenced: Sonora delivered presents to handicapped fathers, boys from the YMCA decorated their lapels with fresh-cut roses (red for living fathers, white for the deceased), and the city's ministers devoted their homilies to fatherhood. This widely publicized event in Spokane struck a note that reached all the way to Washington, D.C. and Sonora's celebration put the idea on the path to becoming a national holiday.

For so many years, I blandly passed through Father's Day as just another holiday, and my family would celebrate this day and buy presents for our father. I was reminded of a quote from Mark Twain that has since been altered many times over. "When I was a boy of 14, my father was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have the old man around. But when I got to be 21, I was astonished at how much the old man had learned in seven years." Those wouldn't have been exactly my words but certainly, the thought would have resonated. Thinking back, my father of six children

(spanning 18 years) was industrious, fair, honest, faithful, and loved and encouraged each of his children. I naively thought each child and family enjoyed a similar relationship. Over the years, I've come to realize that very few children and families experience these qualities of a father, and moreover, many experience just the opposite. They don't have a role model to look up to or to pattern their life after. Unfortunately, that's the world we are presently living in.

However, the "Good News" is the creator of the world and every human within it has a heavenly Father. "For God (the Father) so loved the world (His children) that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16 ...and have it abundantly

I look at these qualities/attributes of my heavenly Father and realize how I fall short of being a father of three daughters and a grandfather of eight grandchildren. God knows my sinful condition and He has a solution. Acknowledge these shortcomings before our Lord, and He will forgive and restore. His WORD provides wisdom and guidance, so it's never too late to begin to apply these truths to our role as a "father" and a "grandfather."

There is no father that is perfect, except our heavenly Father. Learn from Him, and this will become the greatest gift you can give to your children and grandchildren

and will glorify our heavenly Father. Think of the many attributes of our heavenly Father that we can learn from and apply to our children: love, kindness, goodness, patience, compassion, truth, wisdom, faithfulness, justness, graciousness, and others. As we ponder on these qualities, by the Holy Spirit's conviction and power, we fathers can be transformed into Christ-like fathers. The journey never ends until our last breath on this earth.
